Prolific teacher, author noted guest at ChessFest XI

Portrayed in *Searching for Bobby Fisher* Pandolfini to lecture at UTD

The *11th Annual ChessFest* at the University of Texas at Dallas will showcase **Bruce Pandolfini**, who is touted to be the premier chess instructor on how to think strategically. ChessFest is a collaboration and celebration of chess organized annually by UT Dallas' Eugene McDermott Library and the renowned Chess Program.

The free, public presentation by Pandolfini will be held at 7 p.m., Thursday, Feb. 23 in the library's McDermott Suite. His topic is "How I Became A Professional Chess Teacher."

A national chess master, Pandolfini has written dozens of instruction books and is a highly sought after chess teacher. To the general public he is most recognizable for the 1993 film *Searching for Bobby Fischer* that was based on the book of the same title by Fred Waitzkin. In the movie actor Ben Kingsley plays Pandolfini who was the mentor for chess whiz kid Josh Waitzkin.

Pandolfini is one of the founders of the Chess-In-The-Schools program in New York and the creator of the Fireside Chess Library. His books include *The ABCs of Chess: Invaluable, Detailed Lessons for Players at All Levels*, and *Chess Target Practice: Battle Tactics for Every Square on the Board*. In addition he is a columnist for *Chess Life*, the must read publication for chess enthusiasts

His legacy spans back to his role as an analyst for PBS's coverage of the 1972 classic match between chess immortals Bobby Fischer and Boris Spassky.

"We are greatly pleased to welcome an honoree with such a legendary reputation as Bruce Pandolfini to UT Dallas," Stallings said. "His approach is to teach students how to think. In his own words, "The ability to read other people and the ability to understand oneself.""

Pandolfini will receive the UT Dallas Chess Educator of the Year Award after the lecture. Past chess luminaries who have received the award are **Susan Polgar**, 2004; **Sunil Weeramantry**, 2005; **Erik Anderson**, 2006; **David MacEnulty**, 2007; **Beatriz Marinello**, 2008; and **Dr. Stephen Lipschultz**, 2009; **Dr. Jonathan Rowson**, 2010; and **Elizabeth Shaughnessy**, 2011.

According to Pandolfini "You need clarity, not clairvoyance . . . Chess is about controlling the moment at hand . . . Thinking too far ahead is a waste of time."
